City of Bellevue Proclaims February 16-23 as Engineers Week

BELLEVUE, FL – At its February 18, 2025, meeting, the Bellevue City Commission officially proclaimed February 16-23 as “Engineers Week” in Bellevue, recognizing the crucial role engineers play in shaping and improving the city’s infrastructure, public safety, and overall quality of life. This designation aligns with National Engineers Week, established in 1951 by the National Society of Professional Engineers, and is celebrated annually during the week of George Washington’s birthday in honor of his legacy as a military engineer.

The proclamation acknowledges the invaluable contributions of engineers in addressing global challenges, driving technological advancements, and fostering innovation. It further highlights the importance of inspiring the next generation of problem-solvers by encouraging students to pursue careers in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM).

In attendance at the meeting was Alan Garri from the Forest Chapter of the Florida Engineering Society (FES), who provided insight into engineering-related events in the region.

- **February 1:** FES partnered with Marion County Public Schools to host the MATHCOUNTS competition at Liberty Middle School, featuring participation from eight middle schools. The winning team will advance to regional and state competitions, with the potential to compete at the national level.
- **March 15:** FES will host **Engineering Day at the Discovery Science Center** from 9:30 AM – 2:30 PM. Open to children ages 5-15, this free event will feature hands-on engineering experiments, including bridge building, water treatment activities, and egg drop competitions. - **April 5:** FES is partnering with the **Institute for Human & Machine Cognition (IHMC)** for a Science Saturday event focused on water and erosion.
